Job readiness: Putting together your best application

Together with our community partner, VPI Working Solutions, we've come up with the following tips to help you create a great resume and prepare for your interview.

Building your resume

- 1. Be clear keep it simple and concise.
- 2. Use key words specific to the position being applied to (tailor your resume according to job duties).
- Include your entire working history and volunteer experience, no job is unimportant!
- 4. Triple-check your contact information and watch out for spelling mistakes.

Interview tips:

- Make sure you are in a quiet space with limited noise or distractions.
- 2. Review the job description prior to the interview to ensure you are ready to answer relevant questions.
- Research the STAR method for answering behavioural-based interview questions and be prepared with your best examples.
- 4. Bring one or two questions to ask the person interviewing you. Ask about opportunities for promotions, if that interests you!

Barbara Battistuzzi Chief Instructor, Rail Transportation Training Department

Barbara Battistuzzi started her career at the TTC as a streetcar operator. After spending a number of years moving customers through the city, she took on progressively responsible roles in the TTC's Operations Training Centre. As a Chief Instructor, she plays a key role in the development of employees as they define their own careers in transit. and a pension. I also knew that there would be opportunities for advancement that would allow me to make use of my education and life experience.

What personal qualities helped you obtain your current role?

My interpersonal and communication skills have helped enormously, and my education. It comes down to knowing how to relate to people no matter their job title, being truthful and transparent, treating people with respect, and going the extra mile when needed. I take pride in a job well done and believing in myself.

What makes you proud of your work?

Helping to develop instructors and employees so that our transit system is safe and customers have a positive experience. I live in downtown Toronto, and both my kids and many friends take the TTC every day. I love to hear when they have positive experiences and I hope I played a small part in that. and many helping hands to cover different shifts, but after a couple of years, it gets much better! I would also say that being a female in a male dominated industry shows my daughters that anything is possible.

How do you decompress after a busy day?

Since I live in the city, I ride my bike to work when I can. I try and walk home or build a walk into my day. I swim. I read. I go for a massage. I take care of me. I leave work at work.
