TTC's 100th anniversary



Operator spotlight



Katherine Khan Bus Operator

The TTC is excited to introduce Katherine Khan as a new member of the Transit Operator Team, Katherine is the first hire from the TTC's Special Program aimed at increasing the number of women in Transit Operations.

Tell us about your background and what brought you to the TTC?

I have a customer service focused background with 13+ years of experience. My former career was in the aviation industry as a Flight Attendant. When COVID-19 hit I was laid off and sought out new opportunities that would take me out of my comfort zone. I ended up getting my Z Driver's License endorsement and started driving a Straight Truck delivering freight across the GTA. Then I thought to myself how can I combine the two, driving and serving the public? The TTC was holding a Women as Transit Operators information session and immediately it clicked, this was how I could do something that combines the two things I like doing - driving and helping people. The TTC is known for connecting people to places and I thought to myself what could be better way to give back to the city that raised me than being employed by the company that's been keeping Toronto moving for 100 years.

How has your experience at TTC been so far?

So far my experience at the TTC has been challenging yet rewarding. You're put in positions where you have to think on the spot and remember all the standard operating procedures of the TTC to maintain the safety of your passengers, yourself, and the bus. Those days where you feel like nothing is going right – you'll have many people leave your bus and tell you what an amazing driver you are and that it's nice to see a woman behind the wheel.

What's the biggest adjustment in becoming an Operator?

The biggest adjustment becoming an Operator is the various shift hours when you first start. You get used to working one shift then you switch to another the next day. You really need to get your rest, eat well and maintain a healthy lifestyle.

What advice would you give to a new Transit Operator starting the training program?

Advice I'd give to a new Transit Operator starting the training program would be to ask many questions, there is literally no such thing as a dumb question.

If you're unsure, ask.

If you want to see something done again or an example, **ask.**

Always, always, always ask.

Be forgiving with yourself! I didn't learn how to drive the bus in one day, it takes time. Believe in yourself and never give up even if you feel like you can't do it or you may not be good at it. It takes time to master operating a 40- or 62-foot bus. With time things get better and easier, have patience. Last but not least, come prepared – mentally, physically and emotionally. Do your homework, ride the route, do whatever it may take or what you feel is necessary to set yourself up for success.

What safety measures are being taken regarding COVID-19?



safety are our washroom keys, we have our own specific keys set apart from the regular universal key that opens everything. This is to ensure our privacy and safety when we are using the facilities as only other women have access to it. There are also phones located in some bathrooms to use if the situation permits. For Operators as a whole the TTC believes in equality and safety for all. There is direct communication with Transit Control at the push of a button in emergency or non-emergency situations. At the division level there is always someone you can communicate with, the TTC believes in the buddy system and if at any time you do not feel safe you can voice this and someone will be there to help. The TTC truly strives for safety for all.



How would you describe your first day independently operating your bus? Were there any surprises?

My first day independently operating my bus was nerve-racking. I made sure that I rode the exact route and run the day before so I could better prepare myself. There were no surprises and everything that I expected and was trained to do I experienced. The training truly prepares you to be a defensive and professional driver, it truly sets you up for success. Safety precautions in regards to COVID-19 that are offered to Transit Operators at the TTC are COVID-19 screenings upon arrival, in the divisions there are tables designated with ample gloves and disinfectant wipes. The supervisors also provide boxes of masks to Operators, so you always have access to a fresh mask while working. On the bus it is mandatory for the Plexiglas barrier to always be used as well as wearing masks for both operators and customers.
